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Students & Visitors

Grant: Grant is an American student from Westmont College studying abroad for the semester at Uganda Christian Univeristy (UCU) in the global health track. He plans to pursue a career in Physical Therapy and hopes to spend time observing in a rehabilitation center while in Uganda. He will be participating in Omni Med core activities three times a week and bring a fresh perspective to our work in the communities. Grant has taken on a project that focuses on mental health awareness in Mukono.

Sophie: Sophie is a senior at Emerson University in Chicago. She is studying at UCU in the global health track for the semester and will be joining Omni Med twice weekly. Sophie plans to apply to nursing school after she graduates this spring! We were happy to meet her health science advisor from Emerson University that visited Omni Med in October. Her focused project entails complications with home births in Mukono district which will be evaluated from the perspective of VHTs at home visits and quarterly traininings.

Anu Bangaley: Anu is a graduate student in Global Health at Northwestern University. She completed her one-month practicuum with Omni Med in the month of October. Her project involved the role of community health workers in cervical cancer awareness. She enjoys cooking in her spare time and has prepared many delicious dishes for staff and volunteers!

GW Nursing: This month we hosted 8 nursing students from George Washington University and their leader, Dr. Karen Dawn. The GW nursing students visit Omni Med as part of their "community health medicine" course for a one week immersive experience. Dr. Dawn travels with GW nursing students for bi-annual trips to Omni Med in October and March. The students focused on hypertension prevention and management in Mukono district. They held community blood pressure screenings, trained VHTs on how to take blood pressures and provided 80 blood pressure cuffs, 80 stethoscopes and 300 pairs of eye glasses.

This month, we held a school visit at Seeta Nazigo Seventh Day Adventist Church during the GW nursing week. The nurses taught 92 children on hand washing. The children were from all class years and highly enthusiastic to learn! Through the support of GW, Omni Med was able to provide a new hand washing station for the entire school to practice good hygiene and bring it home to their families.

Community Screening

We continued our hypertension management initiatives with the GW nursing students this month. We held community screening and education sessions to 40 community members in Kilondo and 35 community members in Golomolo. Students took blood pressures on community members then advised them on lifestyle modifications essential to lowering blood pressure. Several villagers with high blood were identified and we were able to inform them which days the local health center offers free medication for blood pressure management. Further, we distributed brochures on stress and blood pressure management which were translated into Luganda.

We held four Hypertension training sessions in collaboration with GW nursing students. At the training, students educated VHTs on high blood pressure and instructed them on how to take blood pressures in their communities. We distributed 85 blood pressure cuffs and stethoscopes for VHTs to use in their villages. As the VHTs practiced the new skill with the nursing students, we distributed eye-glasses to those who were having difficulty reading the dial on the blood pressure cuff.



Cookstoves:
